Duration of studies

According to the provisions of the Bolognaprocess, which levelled out all European higher education study the undergraduate dearee programs, program takes place over 3 years (6 semesters) in either full time or part time study and leads to 180 ECTS points. The araduate program lasts 2 semesters) and leads to 120 ECTS points.



Eligibility Criteria:

Undergraduate (Bachelor) Study:

3 or 4-year secondary education completed (general or vocational) Proficient in English language: TOEFL (min.score 500) or IELTS (min. score 5.0)

Graduate (Master) Study:

Undergraduate study completed (Bachelor degree holders)
Proficient in English language: TOEFL (min.score 500) or IELTS (min.score 5.0)

Required Admission Documents:

- 1) Application form, available on the following link: https://www.aspira.hr/en/application-form/application-study-programs/
- 2) Passport copy
- 3) Certificate of citizenship or appropriate proof of citizenship (ID card copy)
- 4) Educational documents: secondary school certificate (for undergraduate study); bachelor's degree (for graduate study)

- 5) Transcript of records
- 6) Proof of English proficiency (unless prior education was in English)
- 7) CV and Motivation letter

The documents should be scanned and submitted to International Relations Office via josip.radic@aspira.hr. After reviewing the documents, you will be contacted to take the admission test interview via Skype.

Note that all degree seeking students must undergo the process of recognition of foreign education qualifications for the purpose of continuation of education in Croatia. Aspira coordinates this process with appropriate agencies of Croatian Ministry of Education.

Incoming Erasmus+ Students

Erasmus+ Students Nomination

Erasmus students first need to be nominated by their home universities to the Aspira International Relations Office via e-mail. Nomination needs to include student's full name, e-mail address, semester of planned mobility, study program/ department and level of studies during the mobility period.

Application and Selection

Erasmus+ students selected by their home universities to spend their Erasmus study period at Aspira need to prepare the following documents:

- 1) Erasmus+ studentapplication form
- 2) Motivational letter and CV
- 3) Learning Agreement (students can use either our Learning Agreement form or the form of their home university)
- 4)Transcript of Records issued by their home university
- 5) Copy of valid Passport/ID card

Completed Erasmus Student Application form, Learning Agreement and Transcript of Records need to be duly signed and stamped by home university. Once you have all the documents in place, a scanned copy of each need to be sent to the e-mail address: josip.radic@aspira.hr

Scholarship Opportunities

Scholarships are awarded based on the following criteria:

- 1.Demonstrated financial need;
- 2. Success in high school education completed;
- 3. Extra academic or professional achievement;
- 4. Candidates must not be employed.

The scholarship agreement is extended at the end of each academic year, after Fall exams. Scholarships can be withdrawn in case of repeat years or a GPA dropping below 4.0 (out of 5) in one year. This would entail the loss of further scholarship opportunities. An application form for scholarships is available from the front office, where completed applications are submitted. Scholarship awards are made at the time of enrolment ranking lists.

STUDY AS YOU WORK

It is possible to have work activity with Student contract. To be able to do so, students should register at Student Centre Split in Cvite Fiskovića 5 street (Campus dormitory) with passport, confirmation of enrolment at Faculty (given upon arrival), 2 photos, OIB number and number of the giro-account in Croatia.

Studying while working is suitable for employed people who are not able to regularly attend lectures due to their professional commitments.

Please note that international students are legally allowed to work for 20 hours per week and can be employed through Student Service agency. Part-time students are provided with individual consultations with mentorship, and the teaching materials are available online. The distance learning system 'Merlin' provides high quality participation in classes and long distance interaction with teachers, and the lectures can be followed via video streaming. University College ASPIRA enablespart-time students with a remote place of residence to take certainexams online.

The ECTS and Grading System in Croatia

The Bologna Process, following the BolognaDeclaration of 1999, is a process aimed harmonising the systems of higher education in Europe in order to create a European Higher Education Area. The Bologna Process aims to lead to greater compatibility and comparability of higher education systemsin Europe and thereby make it easier for learners to be mobile and for institutions to attract studentsand scholars from other countries continents. The higher education system in Croatia has

undergone a comprehensive reform within the framework of the Bologna Process. The Croatian higher education system is now structured according to three (undergraduate, graduate and postgraduate) and higher educationstudies in Croatiaare organized accordingto the system transferable credits (ECTS = European Credit Transfer System), thus making it easier for international students(from Europe beyond) to study in Croatia and have their studies recognised in their home countries. The Croatiannational gradingsystem consists of five gradeswith numerical designations 1-5.

In addition to grades, higher education institutions in Croatia award ECTS credits(European Credit Transfer System), as a part of the Bologna system. Although there is no national regulation on this issue, it is common for 1 ECTS credit to be equivalent to approx. 30 student working hours. Credits are awarded when a course has been completed and all required examinations have been successfully taken. 60 ECTS credits represent the workload of one year of study and 30 ECTS credits represent workload of one semester. Grades and ECTS credits are recorded in Student's Transcript of Records.

1. Study Rules and Regulations

Merlin Exams

Merlin is an e-learning system established as a platform for e-learning application projects, i.e. for the implementation of study courses with the application of e-learning technology. It is based on the open code system Moodle which has been

the application of e-learning technology. It is based on the open code system Moodle which has been further developed and tailored to the needs of users. Each student is included in the e-learning system Merlin and can access it through the username and password received at the beginning of the study program. Merlin contains all the necessary information for each course, such as course syllabus, study materials, attendance score and various important notifications. It can be accessed through Aspira website at https://www.aspira.hr/en/study-programs/merlin-e-learning/

The exams are taken in written and/or oral form or by presenting practical work, as determined by the course syllabus. Most courses have midterm exams and continuous assessment throughout semester. Part-time students international students with justifiable reasons can take some exams via Skype, as per prior agreement with the lecturer. There are 3 main exam periods per academic year: February, June and September. The exact exam schedule is published on MERLIN and college notice board in due time. Students have the right to take one exam for the maximum number of 4 times, the 4th time being the exam

in front of the board consisting of three faculty members.

Schedule

Course schedule is distributed at the beginning of each semester and revised on a monthly basis. It is published on e-learning portal, MERLIN, as well as on the notice board.

Dress Code

Students are required to abide by ASPIRA dress code. Female students should wear skirts/ dresses of appropriate length (blow the knee) or long trousers and a shirt or a blouse. During public events, such as Academic year opening ceremony or Career Fair, female students are required to wear black business suits (with skirt or trousers), a white blouse and a red tie. Male students should wear long trousers and shirts, while during public events a black suit with a white shirt and a red tie is the appropriate dress code. It is not permitted to attend the classes in sports clothes, revealing summer clothes, shorts or flip-flops.

Consultation

Every lecturer has a designated time for studentconsultation, as statedin the course syllabus. Individual consultations are also possible per individual arrangement and through MERLIN.

Internship

Internship is an integral part of every study program. ASPIRA Career Centre organizes Career Fair every February to connect students and employers and allow students to find suitable internship and career opportunities. Students are required to have 80 hours of internship during the first and second year of study respectively. During the third study year, the entire last semester is dedicated to internship (225 hours)

Attendance

Students are required to attend the classes regularly. The attendance is recorded on MERLIN and it is required that each student has at least 70% attendance score in order to earn the right to taking the exam. If the attendance score is lower than 70%, the student is denied the right to the exam and needs to retake the course in the following academic year.

2. The Business Career Centre

Aspira College has Business Careers and Student Support Centre (hereinafter: Centre), which aims to coordinate and ensure systematic support for students of the College by providing academic, business, psychological and legal counselling and guidance. The aim of the Centre is to create student profiles according to the demands of the labour market, through the development of synergies between the College, our students and economic factors; our partners in sports, tourism and IT organizations, with the ultimate goal of matching education and demand for educated workforce. Through the Centre, numerous workshops are being implemented that can contribute to strengthening the skills required for students to excel in the job market. Also, Career Day, which we organise once a year, is a prime opportunity for our students to introduce themselves to employers, make contacts, understand labour market needs and ultimately adapt themselves to the demands of the job market. It is also an opportunity for our partners to crystallise new ideas, to direct some of the students to their specific requirements, by providing hands-on work and / or engagement within their work processes and beyond the framework initially set for such an event. The Psychological Counselling Centre was established with the mission of providing psychological assistance and support to students studying at the College, as well as Aspira staff involved in various ways of dealing with students. The Centre also offers legal Advice providing primary legal assistance, free legal advice and various information from the legal profession.



The process of renting private accommodation should begin at least one month prior to arrival to Croatia. Students should seek private accommodation options independently. Monthly rent in private accommodation varies. Rents vary significantly according to location, room size, facilities etc. Other costs such as electricity, heating, water, Internet and phone connection are not included.

As the number of rooms at the Student You can rent from 275 USD (bedroom, shared kitchen and bathroom) to 440 USD monthly (a nice studio apartment), depending on the location, room size, accommodation quality and facilities. Rent is usually due at the beginning of each month. The landlords charge in advance a monthly fee as a deposit to guarantee against damage sin apartment. 4. PIN/OIB number

5. Visa and Residence Permit

There are 2 types of residence permit, up to and more than 90 days. All students, except those with accommodation in student residence up to 90 days (regulated directly by the student residence), must report their stay in Croatia to the Ministry of Interior within 72 hours upon 27entering Croatia.

International students receiving a grant from the Croatian Ministry of Science, Education and Sports are exempt from the fee for temporary residence permit. The temporary residence permit is usually granted for the duration of one year or for the duration of the academic year. Temporary residence authorization is entered into the passport in the form of an adhesive label.

EU students

Health care services are accessed with valid European Health Insurance Card (EHIC).

In the event of unforeseen illness, injury or accident, the EHIC enables access to health care that cannot be postponed until the holder's planned return to the home country. The costs are covered by the national health care provider in the holder's country of permanent residence, and the holder is obligated to cover only the participation fees in Croatia, if they are mandatory for Croatian insurance holders as well. Medically necessary health care includes treatment related to chronic or pre-existing conditions, unless the express purpose of travel to Croatia obtain treatment (such as high blood pressure 26ontrol), as well as health care related to

pregnancy and childbirth, unless the express purpose of stay in Croatia is childbirth. Necessary medical treatment also includes services such as dialysis, oxygen therapy, or asthma treatment; however, arrangements should be made with relevant health care facilities in advance. The EHIC does not cover the costs of planned medical treatment or health care services with private providers. Also, the EHIC is not an alternative to travel insurance. It does not cover costs such as mountain rescue in ski resorts, return flights to the home country, or stolen or lost property.

Non EU-students

Non EU-students must be fully insured against illness, accidents, death and civil liability for the whole duration of the stay in Croatia. Regulated health insurance is the prerequisite for being granted temporary residence permit.

Countries with health care agreements with Croatia

The issue of health care for foreign non EUnationals during their stay in Croatia through the signed agreements on social security is regulated with some countries. Students should contact their public health insurance provider prior arrival in Croatia in order to check if there is an agreement on social security signed with Croatia. If yes, students will obtain the certificate which enables them to receive health care in Croatia. Upon arrival in Split, student should replace the certificate of healthcare entitlements with the patient's

certificate (in Croatian: bolesnički list) at the Croatian Institute for Health Insurance (HZZO - Hrvatski zavod za zdravstveno osiguranje), street Obala kneza Branimira 14, office hours: Monday- Friday from 08.00 to 16.00. On presentation of the patient's certificate, student may obtain healthcare services from any doctor or health institution who has a contract with the HZZO within the scope established by bilateral agreement, but are required to pay participation fee if that is foreseen for Croatian insures.

Countries without health care agreements with Croatia

Students from countries which do not have social security agreements with Croatia (or if students are unable to obtain the document foreseen by the social security agreement) are obliged to become insured with the Croatian Institute for Health Insurance (HZZO). Steps are:

- * upon arrival in Split present all necessary documents to the Central Police Station and get the OIB number;
- * with OIB number go to HZZO office in street Obala kneza Branimira 14 with office hours: Monday-Friday from 08.00 to 16.00. who will register the student in temporary evidence and issue relevant confirmation which entitles student and binds the HZZO to medical insurance after the residence regulation;

with the HZZO temporary confirmation, student returns to Central Police Station where the temporary residence permit is issued:

- *after bringing a copy of the residence confirmation to the HZZO, the HZZO issues the right to full health care within the of network physicians and health the HZZO institutions of (necessary documents: a copy of the first page of the passport, a copy of the passport page with visa and copy of the residence а confirmation);
- * the monthly health insurance cost is approximately 58 USD per month (around 55 EUR, for which the appropriate Tax Department of the Ministry of Finances sends money orders to the students' registered place of residence in Croatia.

7. X-Card

Student identity card X card (so called "iksica") is a document that proves the student status and provides a student certain benefits such as subsidized meals at Student restaurants and cafeterias all over Croatia, subsidized public transport, discounts on tickets for bus and rail transport, discounts on tickets to the cinema and theatre etc.

X-card can be used only by the person to whom it was issued and it is valid until the date by when the student has a valid registration of the year/semester at the institution.

X-cards are issued by Faculties, so the students need to follow the following procedure:

1. Upon registration of her/his stay in Croatia and obtaining the OIB number (PIN - Personal

Identification Number), student goes to the Student registration office of her/his faculty which:

- a) Registers student in student files
- b) determines the level of subsidized meals
- c) makes request for printing personalized card (with photo)
- d) assigns a temporary card which is not personalized and with which student gets subsidized meals
- 2. Upon delivery of printed card student returns temporary card and receives personalized card.
- 3. The cost of card issuance is to be paid by the student.
- 4. After the mobility period student is required to return the card to be cancelled. After that, student can keep the card.

8. Cost of Living

Currency

The Croatian Currency is KUNA (kn or HRK), which is divided into 100 LIPA (lp)

Coins have denominations of 1, 2, 5 kuna and 5, 10, 20, 50 lipa.

Banknotes come in eight different denominations: 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200, 500 and 1,000 Kuna.

The web site of the Croatian national bank provides daily update of the official exchange rate of the Kuna to major foreign currencies. Foreign currency can be exchanged in banks, exchange offices, post

offices and in the majority of tourist information offices, hotels and campsites.

Credit Cards

MasterCard, Visa, Diners are accepted in almost all hotels, marinas, restaurants, shops and cash machines.
